

Lancashire Schools Sustainability Forum SUSTAINABILITY LEARNING CONFERENCE 27th June 2023 Blackburn Rovers Football Club in association with BRFC Trust <u>Conference Report</u>

The Lancashire Schools Sustainability Forum places education for sustainability at its very heart by offering children and young people a range of hands on, learning beyond the classroom opportunities not covered by statutory curriculum funding. It attracts support from, and promotes, outdoor education programmes including forest schools' activities. It provides teachers with continued professional development.

On Tuesday the 27th of June, the Lancashire Schools Sustainability Forum, in close association with the Sustainability Learning CIC delivered another successful schools' conference, focusing on promoting the 'pupil voice'. The Forum acted as a platform for sharing skills, knowledge and experience in promoting education for sustainable development. It encouraged environmental education and learning outside the classroom, with an emphasis on real world links to jobs and future career prospects for the older students.

The 14th conference was hosted at Blackburn Rovers Football Club with support from the Blackburn Rovers Community Trust

The aims were to-

• provide an effective, stimulating learning environment where a targeted audience of high school students and Key Stage 2 pupils, from schools in Lancashire and beyond would add to their knowledge linked to education for sustainable development.

• provide workshop and marketplace learning experiences for everyone, and school team competitions, workshops, and challenges for high school students.

• involve environmental groups in delivering learning activities linked to Global Citizenship, Healthy Living, Biodiversity, School Grounds, Water, Marine, Waste, Energy, Litter and Transport in workshop settings or in the marketplace.

• invite guest speakers to deliver presentations to students and school personnel.

• invite high schools to showcase some of their ESD linked projects. This year Pleckgate Academy from Blackburn, Skipton Girls' Grammar School and St Christopher's CE Academy's Eco-Group from Accrington had displays in the marketplace, manned by students.

• provide a platform for environmental groups to promote their services to school and to share good practice and inform school staff.

Children built on their existing knowledge and left with innovative ideas to share with others in their schools. High school students learnt through engaging with team events and marketplace learning activities. There was an opportunity for the sharing of good practice and cross-generation learning. School staff increased their understanding of learning for sustainability; taking away ideas to introduce in their school from September 2023

Marketplace organisations networked and made links with schools attending the event.

There were strong curriculum links including Sciences, Physical Geography (including the global dimension), Technology, Literacy, Maths, and creative subjects.

The Conference was run as a not-for-profit event and was dependent on securing sponsorship. As in previous years, there was input from members of the Lancashire Sustainability Forum, students from St Christopher's CE Academy's Eco-Group and Blackburn Rovers Community Trust personnel.

Support and sponsorship were gratefully received from -

- The BRFC Trust who provided classroom accommodation, commitment, enthusiasm, and general input.
- Sodexo who allowed us to use the Legend Suite rooms.

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- David Luke School Wear who sponsored the Upcycled Garment Competition.
- Aqua Explorers provided the bonus for the winning Production Line Team.
- Sponsorship was received from Solar for Schools to meet the cost of running the two CPD sessions and the Co-op donated Fairtrade tea and coffee for marketplace groups, and compostable bags used as school conference bags and The Bee Centre donated fudge for the marketplace bags.
- Prospect Foundations offered sponsored places to all schools in Hyndburn, and other sponsored pupilplaces were provided by We Be Kids, and Eco-Schools.

Registration fees helped meet the general running costs, including production line wages, conference bags and administration costs.

Forty-one primary schools were represented, sending on average six to eight children and two school staff. Approximately three hundred children watched a Calamity Climate Change performance by Arty-Facts Theatre Company and had access to all thirty-four marketplace learning activities.

One hundred and eighty students from thirteen high schools were entered in team challenges, workshops, and presentations. Forty-eight students took on the role of group guides. Forty-two Year 7 pupils made up seven production line team. There were four specific high school presentations and workshops delivered by Solar for Schools, Lets Go Zero. David Penney and CND

Schools travelled from Accrington, Blackburn, Blackpool, Bolton, Bury, Chorley, Great Harwood, Greater Manchester Lancaster, Leyland, Morecambe, Oswaldtwistle, Preston, Rochdale, Rossendale, Skipton, and Wigan to experience the day's activities. More than 20% of schools took advantage of the 'early bird' registration deal.

Separate schedules were run for school staff, KS2 children and KS3/4 students.

New groups included Let's Go Zero, Love to Ride, We Be Kids, Earth Cubs, The Lancashire Schools Sailing Association, Electricity NW, Community Railways, Farm Urban, Micro-Climate Books, National Governors Association and Ocean Generation.



Glynis Goldsbrough (Conference Facilitator) performed front of house and behind the scenes tasks. She was on hand to liaise with attending schools, workshop, and marketplace providers. Wendy Litherland, and Ryan Loftus were responsible for 'front of house' duties.

Conference strengths were judged to be:

To continue to attract more school governors. Better signposting to Legend Suite activities. More time for school personnel to investigate the marketplace with extended passports.

To involve more teacher training providers in Climate Action and in-set training.
